Between 2016-2020:



95% of schools reported students were more aware of and had greater knowledge about gardening, agriculture, and the environment

of schools reported students had improved knowledge of nutrition and healthy eating





89% of schools reported that students' food literacy skills had improved

of schools reported students had improved knowledge of the origin of their food





75% of schools reported the salad bar increased their capacity to produce food in their school garden and/or greenhouse

32% of students reported their focus in class had increased





26% of students reported they had more desire to be at school
