The 5th cycle of the Farm to School Canada Grants Program, that we've launched in partnership with the Whole Kids Foundation, is still open for applications until April 5th. Check out our applicant webinar if you're working on your application!

Delivered directly to schools, the grants are valued at up to \$10,000 each and are designed to bring more healthy, local foods into school communities. They support hands-on food literacy, such as growing, harvesting and cooking food at school; and school meal services, such as salad bars, that allow students to build their own bowls or create their own plates.


